

#### From the President

The International Competition is the highlight of our Society's year. At this time, we have the opportunity to see and appraise the work of our fellow watercolorists in the United States and other countries of the world. Nearly 600 slides were submitted and we saw them all. We thereby acquired an understanding of the current status of the field and where we, as individual artists, belong.

Our 2003 Exhibition is outstanding in both breadth and professionalism. Included are landscapes, seascapes, portraits, still lifes, human activities, to the most intellectual of abstracts from artists in top form and at the top of their fields. The colors range from the most subtle to the glowing, intense, and even audacious. This is a show that will dazzle the eyes as well as engage the mind. In short, it is not to be missed.

No competition comes together without substantial time and the hard work of many people. Our first magazine advertisements were sent off in July, 2002 and our exhibition opens in May, 2003. Over this time, many people contributed their time and effort to bring this show together. I personally learned a lot from her lecture to the membership. First, paint what you like. Second, let your personality show through. And last, but certainly not least, I would especially like to thank Karen Stakelum, our show chairman. Without Karen's devotion, expertise, time and hard work this show would not have come together. Karen will have overseen, and personally performed many parts of the entire process, from sending in the original magazine advertisements to making certain that the display boards are returned to WYES at the end of the show. Congratulations to Karen for a job very well done. Brava!

Finally, I would like to end by encouraging all those artists who submitted slides but who were not chosen for inclusion in this show. Approximately 600 slides had to be pared to 82. Therefore, some extremely difficult decisions had to be made. Yet all of the submissions were of the highest quality and worthy of inclusion. Therefore, do not give up as a competitor. Keep sending in your slides to as many competitions as you can. And above all else, keep painting.

#### **Juror's Statement**



It is with great pleasure that I serve as a return juror and I would like to thank the Louisiana Watercolor Society for giving me this honor and privilege.

In this current climate of geopolitical events, we must remember that art endures and that creating art is something we can do to reflect the humanity of our times. Through art, we can be positively productive. Viewing the entries, I am once again reminded of the dedication and thoughtfulness of so many artists in the watermedia world.

While flying over the states in between California and Louisiana, I was looking down at the landscape, and it dawned on me that one hundred years from now, every living person down there will have been replaced, but the art which is being made right now might still be here. I am not saying that we will go down in art history; probably none of us will. But the sincere efforts we make might be passed down from one small group of people to the small circles of future owners then. Art will last in some modest ways, but it will last.

Whatever our passions, our regrets, our wonder, our awe, our anger, our joy, our observations, our reflections, whatever we feel deeply, we must find a way to convey it. We should not pass judgment on whether those sentiments are worth our efforts; we should make the effort so that no one can ignore them.

While going through the slides for this show, I was reminded of the expectations participants often have of a juried show, and also of how those expectations may be too high. What the juror can do is thoroughly screen all the entries and make an attempt at fair and sound decisions about the relative strengths of the work. Among a group of submissions, there are always the outstanding pieces, paintings which have the intensity of the artist's content, and are well expressed by his/her practiced and authentic artistic language. These paintings are most obvious to the juror as the clear choices.


But when an artist can enter more than one entry, as in this show, and the juror is asked to select only one from each deserving artist, then the situation gets more complex. Sometimes seasoned artists enter a painting from a practiced approach, together with a painting that represents a possible and exciting new direction. Or intermediate artists may, in the process of developing their form and content, enter entirely different approaches to seek some answers as to which direction is better. The juror's selections are not in a position to help an artist discover which directions to move in, or reward an artist for taking risks with new ideas before they are well-realized. Those decisions need to be made by the artists themselves.

The judging of a competitive show is based on only the couple of entries that each artist chose to enter, not on the validity of the direction the artist is taking, and certainly not on the ultimate potential of the artist. For each of us, I really believe the only valid measurement is the development of our own work over time. Seeing that development in progress is the best reward for an artist, and that growth is where the real measurement lies.

Thank you to all the artists who participated in this year's LWS entries. I believe that this is a strong show with vitality and intensity. I hope artists and visitors alike will find the exhibit riveting, informative and thoroughly engaging.
